Established in 1966, the Border Canary Association (BCA) has long stood as a proud cornerstone of the Border fancy, offering a dedicated platform for fanciers in the region and beyond. Initially founded with a sole focus on Border canaries, the club has remained faithful to its roots while showing a commendable willingness to evolve. In 2019, recognising the growing interest in the wider canary fancy, the BCA opened its doors to Fife canary classes, demonstrating both inclusivity and forward thinking.

Over the years, the BCA has gained a reputation for its well-run and welcoming events. Its annual show, once a traditional two-day affair, now takes place on the first Saturday of every November, making it more accessible while maintaining its prestige. The show continues to be a significant date on the canary calendar, attracting exhibitors and enthusiasts from across the country.

The club's shows cater for both Border and Fife canaries, offering a range of competitive classes that reflect the high standards of breeding and exhibition associated with the BCA. The event is hosted at Ednam Village Hall, Stichill Road, Ednam, TD5 7QQ, a venue that provides an ideal setting with ample space and the warm, community feel that the club is known for.

The BCA's competitive history also boasts some notable moments. Legendary breeder Phil Warne etched his name into the club's annals by claiming Best in Show for an extraordinary ten consecutive years—a feat that speaks volumes about the quality and calibre associated with both the exhibitor and the competition.

Under the stewardship of dedicated fanciers like Fraser Anderson, the Club continues to thrive but one area that is in need of help is the need for volunteers and helpers to set up and take down the staging at the Annual Show.
